### Answer Key for Speakers from Pennsylvania

Mick	'fly'	<u>Micke</u>
Messer	'knife'	<u>Messre</u>
Baam	'tree'	<u>Beem</u>
Yaahr	'year'	<u>Yaahre</u> (*This is spelled differently than it is pronounced. In Pennsylvania, it is pronounced yor like the -or in 'for')
Meisli	'mouse'	<u>Meislin</u> (or sometimes Meislis)
Rock	'dress'	<u>Reck</u>
Haus	'house'	<u>Heiser</u>
Hiwwel	'hill'	<u>Hiwwle</u> (The two ww's are pronounced like a v.)
Draub	'grape'	<u>Drawwe</u> (The two ww's are pronounced like a v.)
Kissi	'pillow'	<u>Kissis</u>
Pasching	'peach'	<u>Pasching</u> (some words are the same in singular and plural)

\*If you are from a community outside of Pennsylvania or a non-Anabaptist community, your answers might be slightly different for some of these because of dialectal differences. For example, if you're from Ohio, you probably say *Messere* instead of *Messre*.
